




Figure 1. This is a figure, Schemes follow the same formatting. If there are multiple panels, they should be listed as (a) Description of what is contained in the first panel; (b) Description of what is contained in the second panel. Figures should be placed in the main text near to the first time they are cited. A caption on a single line should be centered.

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Appendix A

The appendix is an optional section that can contain details and data supplemental to the main text. For example, explanations of experimental details that would disrupt the flow of the main text, but remain crucial to understanding and reproducing the research shown; figures of replicates for experiments of which representative data is shown in the main text can be added here if brief, or as Supplementary data. Mathematical proofs of results not central to the paper can be added as an appendix.

All appendix sections must be cited in the main text. In the appendixes, Figures, Tables, *etc.* should be labeled starting with 'A', e.g., Figure A1, Figure A2, *etc.*

7. REFERENCES

Referencing is about acknowledging the ownership of resources used in your academic writing, and provides information necessary to identify and retrieve the work cited in the text.

There are many different referencing styles. At Horizon, we use the APA reference style.

Lists every source (no limitation) but list those that may be of interest to readers and are current. "Each reference cited in text must appear in the reference list, and ensure each entry in the reference list must be cited <u>in-text</u>" (correspondence between in-text citations and your reference list).

The references are to be alphabetized by the fist author's last name, or (if no author is listed) the organization or title. In-text citations and references are complete and consistently styled and formatted as per the journal's in-house style (APA 6^{th} or 7^{th} ed.). As a rule of the thumb; cite what you use, use what you cite.
